David John Woods Sr. Indicted for First Degree Murder by the Roane County Grand Jury

The Roane County Grand Jury met yesterday and today and heard testimony on some 80-plus cases that will be announced in the forthcoming Grand Jury Report from Criminal Court Clerk Ann Goldston's Office later in the week.

One of the cases involved the death of 78 year old former

US Marine Donald Woods of 836 Hen Valley Road in the Kellytown area of Oliver Springs on Friday night/Saturday morning (February 5th/6th). Ronald Woods was found by Oliver Springs Police on Saturday during a well fare check called in my Woods' family from Florida who

had been expecting to hear from him. Woods was found handcuffed on the floor of his bedroom at the residence with yellow Dollar General shopping bags next to him that had apparently been placed over his head and duct-taped around his neck causing him, according to an autops-

Honoring Our Fallen Agents

Memorial Services Pay Tribute to Laura Schwarzenberger and Daniel Alfin

Colleagues, family, and friends gathered this weekend to honor the lives of FBI Special Agents Laura Schwarzenberger and Daniel Alfin, who were killed in the line of duty February 2, 2021, in Sunrise, Florida, while serving a federal search warrant in a crimes against children investigation. Memorial services

were held Saturday and Sunday at Hard Rock Stadium in Miami Gardens. Law enforcement officers escorted the caskets to the stadium, where both agents were eulogized by FBI Director Christopher Wray. The services included an honor guard salute, a riderless horse, a pipe and drum corps, and a helicopter fly-

over. Director Wray also presented the American flags that had draped the caskets to the agents' families.

"On Tuesday, we lost not one of our own, but two," Wray said at the services. "Two warriors who took on one of the hardest jobs in the FBI, crimes against children. Two

sy conducted at the Knox Regional Forensics Center on Monday, to die as the result of asphyxiation, according to Dr. Lauren Havrilla's report.

The Tennessee Bureau of Investigation was pre-dicated by District Attorney General Russell Johnson to work the scene along with Oliver Springs Police and investigators from the

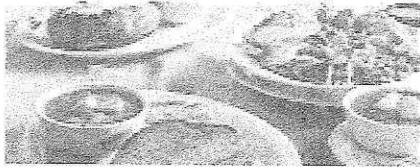
DA's Office. Officers conducted an investigation of the scene and interviewed various individuals including Ronald Woods' 50-year old son, David John Woods, Sr. and his 19 year old grandson, David Woods, Jr., both of whom resided at the house with Ronald Woods. As a result of the investigation David John Woods, Sr. was taken into custody on outstanding Anderson County charges and the death investigation was presented by Oliver Springs Police Captain David Laxton on Tuesday to the Roane County Grand Jury.

The Grand Jury returned the indictment presented by General Johnson's office against David John Woods, Sr. on premeditated murder, felony-murder, robbery and theft of

property \$1,000-\$2,500. David Jones, Sr.'s bond was set by Roane County Criminal Court Judge Jeff Wicks at \$500,000. Arraignment has been set for Monday, February 22, 2021. David John Woods, Sr. was served with his capias on the indictment at the Anderson County Jail earlier today.

Jessica Bahr, 38, Strawberry Hill Road Philadelphia, was charged with Mfg/Del/Sale or Poss. Of Meth, and Man/Sell/Del/Resale Sch. II, III, & IV.

Deputy W. Jenkins LCS, was on routine patrol driving south on Hwy 11 near Sweetwater Valley Farm when a white Toyota Camry passed him heading north and flashed its bright lights at him as it passed. Deputy turned around to get behind the vehicle and could not catch up to it until Deputy was near Callo-way Road due to the vehicles speed. When Deputy did catch up to it he saw that the license plate was displayed improperly and traffic stopped the vehicle. While talking to the driver, Jessica Bahr, Deputy observed a bag with pills and meth in plain view be-

hind the driver seat. Deputy detained Bahr and read her Miranda rights. Bahr then told Deputy that she had just meet a subject to get the narcotics. She told Deputy she wasn't going to use the narcotics but was just going to sell them to make some money. Inside the bag in a smaller bag were 2 and a half orange pills that the offender identified as suboxone (sch. III), half a light blue pill the offender identified as Adderall (sch II), and two darker blue pills that the offender identified as Klonopin (sch. IV). In another small bag was a crystalline rock weighing approximately 2 grams that the offender identified as meth. There was also an additional small bag that was empty. The offender was transported to the Loudon County Jail without incident.

Remembering Special Agent Laura Schwartzenberger

Laura Schwartzenberger joined the FBI in 2005 and first worked in the Albuquerque Field Office. In 2007, she became the first female FBI SWAT team member in Albuquerque. In 2010, she transferred to the Miami Field Office to work crimes against children cases.

Schwartzenberger was passionate about keeping children safe online, often giving talks to parents on the topic.

She is survived by her husband and two sons.

Remembering Special Agent Daniel Alfin

Daniel Alfin joined the FBI in 2009 and first worked in the Albany Field Office. In 2014, he went to work in the Crimes Against Children Unit at FBI Headquarters, before transferring to the Miami Field Office in 2017.

Alfin was remembered for his technical skill and persistence. He received the Director’s Award, the highest honor an FBI employee can receive, for an investigation that took down a child sexual exploitation site on the dark web.

He is survived by his wife and son.

Amy Clarkson, 38, Paw Paw Plains Road Lenoir City, was charged with, Mfg/Del/Sale or Poss. Of Meth, and Poss. Of Drug Para.

Officer R. Miller, conducted a traffic stop on a white in color Toyota Yaris for a window tint violation (windows were at 13%) in the parking lot of the Inn of Lenoir. Upon traffic stop Officer made contact with the driver who identified as Ms. Amy Clarkson.
